MEMORIAL BENCH PROJECT - CREATING LASTING MEMORIES IN OUR PARK

Do you have fond memories of spending time in Marquette Park with family and friends? You might consider keeping their memory alive with the donation of a park bench with a commemorative plaque. Due to the requests for memorial benches, we worked with the Park Board of Commissioners to approve the placement of 20 bench locations throughout the park. There is a choice of two styles of metal benches that compliment the current benches in the

park. There will be specially designed benches in the Lagoon Outlook Garden. This fall, we installed 8 concrete pads in preparation for memorial benches. More pads will be poured in the spring of 2019. There is a chance some benches may be installed this year. Many of the bench locations have been reserved. 2018 is the Deadliest Year for Great Lakes Drownings

This year has been the deadliest on record on the Great Lakes, according to a nonprofit organization that tracks Great Lakes drowning deaths.

The Great Lakes Surf Rescue Project has tracked drowning deaths since 2010, but 2018 is the first year to record more than 100 drownings. A particularly hot summer may have contributed to that record-setting number of tragedies.

So far, 110 people have died in the Great Lakes, including 39 in Lake Michigan and 35 in Lake Erie. Five of the Lake Michigan drownings were in Indiana.

Great Lakes Surf Rescue Project Executive Director Dave Benjamin told The Sentinel in August the summer had multiple weekends with "the perfect storm of conditions" for increased drownings.


Benjamin said warm weekend summer days with high wind and wave conditions make for a dangerous mixture, especially when swimmers ignore red flag warnings at state park beaches.


In the past eight years, there have been 733 Great Lakes drownings. Before this year, 2012 and 2016 were tied for the most drownings, with 99 each. Historically, Lake Michigan is home to nearly half of all the drowning deaths across the five Great Lakes.

Currents, rip tides, undertows, cold temperatures, limited visibility and uneven depths can make swimming in Lake Michigan difficult, along with structural currents near break-walls and man-made structures.

The most likely person to drown in a Great Lake is a male African-American teenager, according to Safe Kids Worldwide. Nearly 85 percent of all drowning fatalities are male and African-American children are twice as likely as white children to drown in open water.

To stay safe while on the Great Lakes, swimmers are reminded to wear life jackets, heed warning flags, check water and weather conditions,





RESPECTING OUR POWERFUL LAKE

Plans are in place to install "dangerous water" and "shelf ice warning" signs for next year. In the meantime, educating everyone who loves to visit our beaches in summer or winter is critically important. They need to know the dangers of rip currents and moving sandbars with unseen drop-offs into deeper water. Non-swimmers are especially at risk.

Winter weather presents new dangers. What appears to be icy hills of sand is really shelf ice that sits on top of constantly moving water. Many people have fallen through shelf ice into very icy water. This could be deadly. Please stay off of shelf ice and warn others of the danger.

Bring your camera and take great photos while standing on solid ground (or sand). Stay safe year-round.
